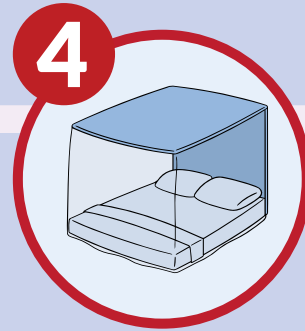

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Message from the Vice Chancellor

Gender Inclusivity and National Goals

As the Vice Chancellor, I take immense pride in how our institution embodies the principles of gender inclusivity and aligns with the national sustainable development goals. Our commitment to mirroring Bangladesh's demographic composition, where approximately 51% are females, is evident in our steadily increasing female student enrollment, which has reached 48% in our recent intakes, marking a significant rise from three years ago. Currently, the female student population at IUB stands at a commendable 45%.

This drive for inclusivity extends beyond our student body to our faculty, where 56% of the full-time faculty recruited in 2023 were female, thereby enhancing female representation in leadership roles from 11% to 27% over the last three years. It is our firm belief that such initiatives, if adopted across the educational spectrum, can significantly accelerate our nation's progress towards its developmental goals.

The remarkable surge in female student enrollment at IUB can be attributed to a blend of special programs, financial incentives, and diverse outreach activities. The ARROWS program, a pioneer in academic excellence and mitigating financial barriers, boasts 60% female participation, reflecting our commitment to gender inclusivity. Furthermore, our curriculum has been adapted to prepare students for the challenges of the 4th Industrial Revolution, requiring all to take a coding class, with concerted efforts to attract more females into Science and Technology fields. Also, there has been a substantial 78% increase in female enrollment in our undergraduate Computer Science and Engineering program since Autumn 2020.

We have also focused on infrastructural improvements and programmatic initiatives tailored to female students' needs, such as upgraded sports facilities, dedicated prayer spaces, and professional coaching for national-level female athletes in different sports such as Squash, Basketball, Table Tennis, Chess and so on. In 2024, we enrolled two female squash players on full scholarships, with hopes that they will represent Bangladesh and IUB in the 2028 Olympics. Our health services have been redesigned to ensure privacy and inclusivity, complemented by a gender-balanced recruitment of service providers.

To further support our female students, IUB offers special tuition remission and need-based housing, with initiatives like the partnership with Bandarban University opening avenues for populations from underserved regions such as the Chittagong Hill Tracts. This unique exchange program highlights our dedication to expanding access and promoting diversity within our campus.

Our efforts over the past few years have been geared towards creating a nurturing environment that not only champions gender inclusivity but also contributes significantly to our national development goals. As we continue to evolve and implement these initiatives, IUB is proud to be recognized as a female-friendly campus, setting a standard for what educational institutions can achieve in terms of gender inclusivity.

Let us all embrace the ethos of "inspire inclusion," celebrating the strides we have made towards creating a balanced and equitable academic environment. It is my honor to lead an institution that stands at the forefront of such a crucial societal transformation, and I am optimistic about the future we are building for all our students, irrespective of gender. •

Resilience Rewriting Destinies

Discover the inspiring journey of IUB alumna Bipasha Tripura, from overcoming educational barriers in Khagrachari to making significant strides at UNESCO and advocating for marginalized communities in Bangladesh.



Bipasha Tripura

From the rolling hills of Khagrachari to the international corridors of UNESCO, Bipasha Tripura's story is not just one of personal triumph but also of inspiration for many. At 27, this dynamic individual from the Tripura community—a small ethnic entity in southeastern Bangladesh—is carving a niche for herself in the development sector, empowered by a solid educational foundation from IUB.

Born in Thakurchara village in Khagrachari in 1997, Bipasha faced socio-economic, educational, and cultural hurdles that stem from living in a marginalized community, compounded by her family's limited financial resources and a broader societal disposition that seldom favors the ambitious girl child. Her mother, deprived of education due to displacement and conflict, and her father, who was able to finish his studies up to class 10, instilled in her a relentless pursuit of education as the gateway to empowerment.

Bipasha attended a local primary school in Khagrachari where she struggled with the Bengali language. She soon realized that to achieve her dreams, she would need to step

beyond the confines of her village. In 2007, she was accepted into class seven at Khagrachari Govt. Girls High School. However, reaching her new school, located in the district

township some 7-8 km from home, was a constant struggle due to a shortage of transportation.

"Most of my day was spent walking to the school and back home. When I was in class 10, my family realized that it would be better for me if I stayed at a relative's place in Khagrachari town. I lived there until I completed my Higher Secondary Certificate [HSC] examinations," Bipasha recollected.

"My father's small business faced a sudden collapse when I was preparing for my HSC exams, and as a result, my family was unable to pay for any additional schooling. I returned to my village after the HSC exams, putting my higher education plans on hold," she added.

Since Khagrachari was a small hill station that didn't have a university, Bipasha understood that in order to pursue her educational goals, she would have to relocate to a big city like Dhaka or Chattogram, which,

however, was not a financially viable option for her or her family.

“After much deliberation, I managed to persuade my family to support my decision to pursue undergraduate studies at Premier University, Chittagong, despite our financial difficulties and familial pressures,” Bipasha explains.

Despite numerous challenges, she completed her undergraduate degree in February 2019. She aspired to pursue a master's degree at a top university in Dhaka, a goal that initially seemed unattainable due to the high costs of living and studying in the capital. To build her professional profile, she spent a year volunteering with organizations including Voluntary Service Overseas (VSO) Bangladesh and BRAC James P Grant School of Public Health. Her persistence paid off when she secured a scholarship at IUB to pursue a Master's in Development Studies.

“IUB was one of the driving forces in my journey. The scholarship and support I received there were pivotal, allowing me to lay a strong foundation for my career. I am deeply grateful to IUB for empowering me to transform challenges into

stepping stones towards achieving my dreams,” reflects Bipasha.

“I am both grateful and delighted that I am the first girl in my extended family to earn a master's degree. Unfortunately, my two brothers were not as lucky. They faced similar challenges and, despite completing HSC, they were compelled to discontinue their college education due to these difficulties,” said Bipasha.

Having worked for several years as a volunteer for the Culture Program at UNESCO Dhaka Office, Bipasha joined the same program as

a Junior Consultant in April 2024. She plays a role in shaping cultural narratives and initiatives that have global resonance. Her work supports UNESCO's mission of preserving cultural heritage and promoting peace and sustainability.

“To the young women from marginalized communities in Bangladesh, I would like to say that your background does not define your future. Education is your most powerful tool for change. Believe in your ability to overcome barriers and seize every opportunity to learn and grow. Stand firm in your aspirations, and remember, every step forward is a step toward transforming not just your life but your entire community,” encourages Bipasha.

Looking ahead, she seeks to continue her involvement in UN organizations, pursue further studies abroad, and utilize her skills and experiences to contribute meaningfully to both her community and the global stage. Her journey reminds us of the power of resilience and the impact of education in transcending boundaries, making her story not only noteworthy for its achievements but also for its potential to inspire future generations at IUB and beyond. •

Nushrat Explores Intelligent Imaging to Study Uterine Peristalsis in Japan

Nushrat Afroz Roza, a student of Computer Science and Engineering at Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB), is conducting research in Japan on advanced intelligent imaging technologies for studying uterine peristalsis. Her work focuses on the implications of Cesarean Scar Syndrome treatment on reproductive functions, under the guidance of professors from the University of Hyogo and IUB.

Uterine peristalsis refers to the rhythmic contraction of the muscles in the uterus. This involuntary movement is a fundamental aspect of the female reproductive system and plays several crucial roles such as menstruation, fertility, implantation and childbirth.

Her study is based on earlier research works, which found that understanding the workings and impacts of uterine peristalsis in different stages through highly advanced imaging technology can ensure advanced care for women and help prevent future reproductive issues.

Starting in September 2023, Nushrat, an undergraduate student of IUB, is currently pursuing a one-year research program at the University of Hyogo in Japan on this very technology. Supported by a Japanese government scholarship known as "Student Study Abroad for Research," Nushrat's research is titled "Infertility diagnosis after cesarean section using uterine CineMR images."

The research explores the potential impact of Cesarean Scar Syndrome (CSS) treatment on uterine peristalsis, with the aim of revealing correlations with subsequent pregnancy outcomes. Nushrat is being

jointly supervised by Professor Dr. Syoji Kobashi from the University of Hyogo and Associate Professor Dr. Saadia Binte Alam from IUB.

"Since the program commenced, I have been balancing between feelings of homesickness and my determination to make the most of this extraordinary opportunity," said Nurshrat, who is living away from her family for the first time in her life.

"I have been given specific areas on uterus images by medical experts to study. From there, I have gathered data about their intensity and changes over time. My goal is to use this information to compare and understand the differences in patients with and without a condition called CSS, both before and after they receive treatment," she added.

The research also aims to distinguish between cases with and without CSS, clarifying characteristic differences in CineMR imaging. Alongside, a deep learning model is under development to forecast pregnancy outcomes and provide insights into correlations between peristaltic patterns, surgeries, and successful pregnancies.

True to Japan's tradition of high research standards and meticulous work ethic, she is facing a highly competitive research environment. However, helpful colleagues and peers have been making things easy for her.

"I think I have adapted to the Japanese cultural trait of perfection and punctuality quite well. Sometimes I also marvel at how

safe the country is for its residents to move about freely regardless of age and gender," she said.

However, Nushrat has not been all work only and no play. She has made new friends and travels around a lot. She describes Japan as a tourist haven with rich cultural heritage preserved over a millennium, and abundant with scenic natural elements for outdoor activities enthusiasts. She has also become quite fond of the local cuisine.

Farheen Khan, Director of International Programs & Relations at IUB, said, "Nushrat is the first student to qualify for this prestigious one-year research program at the University of Hyogo, Japan. It is especially rewarding for us as she was a recipient of the Japanese government's HUMAP [Hyogo University Mobility in Asia and the Pacific] scholarship that enables and encourages foreign students from partner universities to spend time expanding their academic and professional skills in Japan."

Nushrat's post-return plans involve fulfilling IUB's graduation criteria, defending her thesis, and publishing findings from her study at the University of Hyogo. Intent on integrating new research techniques, she envisions fostering collaboration between the two universities.

Post-graduation, she prioritizes publishing, leveraging connections for collaborations, and seamlessly integrating methodologies into ongoing academic work. Her career alignment with research interests is guided by self-reflection for holistic personal and professional growth.●

IUB Retains Top Spot as Bangladesh's Best Private University in AD Scientific Index



Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB) has retained its spot as the leading private university in Bangladesh in the AD Scientific Index 2024 in terms of total number of citations of Scopus-indexed publications by faculty members.

IUB has also retained the second position among all private institutions in the country, trailing only behind ICDDR,B. Furthermore, the university has ranked 3rd among all public and private institutions in Bangladesh, moving up one place from the previous year, currently trailing only behind ICDDR,B and the University of Dhaka.

Since February 2023, IUB has consistently maintained its position in the ADSI ranking. Last year, IUB was ranked first among private universities, second among all private institutions and 4th among all institutions in Bangladesh.

The AD Scientific Index (ADSI), a global ranking system, evaluates over 22,350 universities worldwide based solely on the caliber of their "Valued and Productive Scientists". The ADSI primarily utilizes Google Scholar profiles for its assessments. The ADSI, known

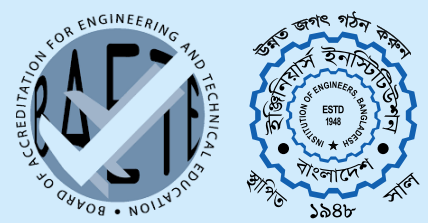
for its dynamic updating process every 30 to 60 days, noted IUB's improvement in its latest update on January 6, 2024.

Vice Chancellor Tanweer Hasan, PhD, said, "I am proud and delighted to extend my heartfelt congratulations to our faculty. This consistent recognition distinctly underscores the dedication and exceptional caliber of our faculty at IUB. We are committed to ensuring a supportive and resource-rich environment in advancing the research endeavors of our faculty members."

He also said, "Over the last three years, we have taken significant steps to offer both organizational support and financial incentives, encouraging our faculty to engage in cutting-edge research. During this period, we added 59 PhD-holders to our existing roster, bringing the total number of PhD-qualified faculty at IUB to 108. This accolade is therefore a manifestation of our collective, organization-wide efforts and exemplifies our continued commitment to academic excellence."

BSc. in EEE Program Secures 5-Year BAETE-IEB Accreditation



The BSc. in Electrical and Electronic Engineering (EEE) program at IUB has received accreditation renewal for a remarkable 5-year period from the Board of Accreditation for Engineering and Education (BAETE) under the Institution of Engineers, Bangladesh (IEB), Dhaka, making it the lengthiest term ever for an EEE program in Bangladesh.

The renewal, spanning from 2024 to 2029 under the latest BAETE Manual version 2.1, highlights the program's commitment to excellence in engineering education. The renewal process, anchored by the Self-Assessment Report (SAR), meticulously evaluated the program across ten criteria, including Organization and Governance, Financial and Physical Resources, Faculty, Students, Academic Facilities, Curriculum, Teaching-Learning Process, Program Educational Objectives, Program Outcomes and Assessment, Continuous Quality Improvement, and Interaction with the Industry.

Aligned with the Washington Accord's Graduate Attributes, the program also upholds 12 Program Outcomes (POs) as stipulated by BAETE: Cognitive, Psychomotor, and Affective domains, emphasizing graduates' abilities to tackle complex engineering problems. A three-member BAETE evaluation team conducted a comprehensive assessment during their visit at IUB campus from December 13-15, 2023, scrutinizing all aspects of the program to ensure alignment with accreditation standards. •

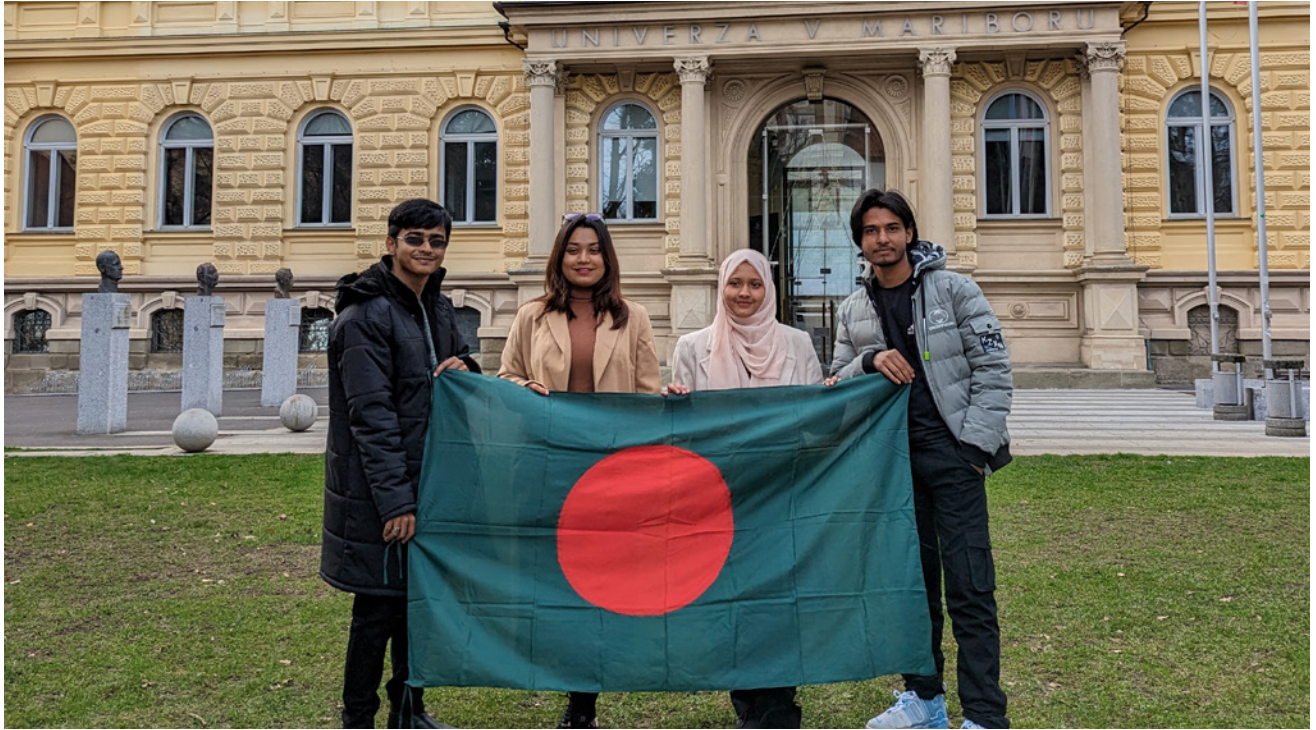
In an earlier tribute, on December 2, 2023, an IUB delegation visited Dr.

IUB is actively expanding its global educational affiliations through strategic international exchange, student and faculty semester abroad mobility programs, robust academic partnerships with reputed higher education institutions, and the recruitment of distinguished foreign faculty. IUB currently has 15 international students and offers attractive scholarships and bursaries for all prospective international undergraduate and postgraduate students. These efforts highlight IUB's commitment to internationalization, aiming to provide its community with comprehensive global exposure and create a diverse educational environment.

In January 2024, five students from the School of Engineering, Technology and Sciences (SETS) participated in a student mobility program at the Vellore Institute of Technology (VIT) in Tamil Nadu, India.

Foreign faculty recruitment efforts brought Dr. Nagesh Rao from the USA and Dr. Xingkui Wang from China to the Department of English and Modern Languages in January and April, respectively. Dr. Rao brings a rich background in literary theory and Kashmiri politics, while Dr. Wang offers expertise in philosophy, art history, and literature, enriching the department's offerings in history and civilization, as well as academic writing. •

PROF. SALEEMUL HUQ MEMORIAL LECTURE

Forced Choice between Development and Adaptation Unjust

Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB) hosted the Prof. Saleemul Huq Memorial Lecture titled "Promoting Climate Justice: Roles of Courts and Youth" on April 16, 2024 at the IUB Auditorium in Bashundhara Residential Area, Dhaka. The memorial lectures were delivered by Mr. Saber Hossain Chowdhury, MP, Hon'ble Minister for Environment, Forest, and Climate Change (MoEFCC), Government of the People's Republic of Bangladesh; and Professor Dr. César Rodríguez-Garavito from New York University School of Law.

Mr. Saber Hossain Chowdhury, MP, spoke on Promoting Climate Justice through Youth Engagement. He said, "We had the least to do with the creation of the problem, and yet we are the most impacted. So, that is injustice any way you look at it. The other aspect is we are forced to adapt beyond our capacity. That is also injustice. We are also being forced to choose between development — investment in health, infrastructure, education, IT, training, capacity building — and investing in trying to protect our

people from the impacts of climate change. That is yet another injustice."

He also said, "We planted a million trees all over Bangladesh on the centenary of our Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. But the mortality rate [of trees] is high; we will lose 30% of the trees in the first year. But there's still 70% left. Can we get young people to adopt a tree? You water the tree, you see it grow. This is how we have environmental stewardship."

"We don't want the young generation to just listen; we also want to listen to them. We want to see young men and women have a seat at the table. We want them to be partners in implementation. We also want them to do an audit on the value and impact of that implementation. That completes the whole cycle," he added.

About Dr. Huq, his longtime compatriot in the global fight against climate change, the minister said, "He has inspired a

climate generation in Bangladesh. Many of the people I see in the audience today have been touched by his sincerity, commitment and an outstanding ability to convince people, especially when he talked about climate science and attribution – the fact that loss and damage are caused by human action.”

Professor Rodriguez-Garavito focused on Promoting Climate Justice through Litigations. He said, “Last week, the Swiss women’s association, KlimaSeniorinnen, won the first ever case on climate change before the European Court of Human Rights. So, one of the most prestigious regional human rights courts have now said clearly and unequivocally that not doing enough against climate change is a violation of human rights. Heatwaves, cyclones, floods, sea-level rise – these are all massive violations of human rights.”

He also said, “The youth movement had provided the energy, moral passion and the impetus that had driven most of the achievements in climate governance. The law and social mobilization – the youth movement and the use of creative,

expansive and rigorous use of the law – go hand in hand.”

Reminiscing his interaction with Prof. Saleemul Huq during the COP27 in Egypt in 2022, Prof. Rodriguez-Garavito said, “One of the things that struck me very deeply was that I had access to him through the leaders of the youth movement. It was not like he was always hanging out with the celebrities and the personalities.”

Md. Nojibur Rahman, former Principal Secretary to the Hon’ble Prime Minister; Dr. Farhina Ahmed, Secretary, MoEFCC; Dr. Ainun Nishat, Professor Emeritus, BRAC University; Syeda Rizwana Hasan, Chief Executive, Bangladesh Environmental Lawyers Association (BELA); Tanweer Hasan, PhD, Vice Chancellor, IUB; Advocate M. Hafijul Islam Khan, Director, Center for Climate Justice-Bangladesh; and Saqib Huq, Managing Director at IUB’s International Center for Climate Change and Development (ICCCAD) also spoke at the event. Professor Dr. Borhan Uddin Khan, Advisor to IUB’s Department of Law, moderated the event.

The event was a collaborative effort among IUB’s Departments of Law and Environmental Science and Management; ICCCAD; Centre for Climate Justice Bangladesh; Center for Human Rights and Global Justice at NYU School of Law; Bangladesh Environment and Development Society (BEDS); Friendship; World’s Youth for Climate Justice; and Local Conference of Youth Bangladesh.

Leading global climate scientist Prof. Dr. Saleemul Huq passed away in Dhaka on October 28, 2023 at the age of 71. He was a Professor at the Department of Environmental Science and Management and Founder Director at the International Center for Climate Change and Development (ICCCAD) of IUB. Recognized by Nature as one of the top ten scientists of 2022, Dr. Huq has played a significant role in the IPCC reports and served as an adviser to the LDC group in the UNFCCC. He was awarded the 2020 National Environment Award by Bangladesh and appointed Officer of the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in 2022. •

An Afternoon with Jon Fosse

The 2023 Nobel Prize for Literature went to Norwegian writer Jon Olav Fosse (b. 1959) for “writing innovative plays and prose which give voice to the unsayable” (the citation). In an instant reaction, the Nobel Laureate said “the prize was recognition of ‘literature that first and foremost aims to be literature, without other considerations’” (AP, Oct 5, 2023). Every inch an artist, Fosse, has always been conscious of his role as an artist and the art he creates. As early as 1997, he declared: “I want to make it clear that for me as a playwright it is impossible to write with ‘social consciousness’, as they say, while also writing good drama” (quoted in Leif Zern, Nordic Literature, 2004). To write good drama, and for that matter, to produce quality literature has always topped his agenda – marks of which are evident in his earliest work, Red, Black (1983) as well as in Septology published in 2022. I was fortunate to meet Fosse at his temporary lodging in an Oslo hotel near Det Norske Teatret on October 27, 2007. Fosse took me to a restaurant nearby where we discussed his notion of art and literature. What follows is a truncated version of the interview published on 31 January 2008 in bdnews24.com.

Ahmed Ahsanuzzaman (AA): As you know, Jon, I’m here in Oslo to do an MPhil in Ibsen Studies. Ibsen is one of my favourite playwrights, and to an extent also my obsession. Ibsen is your glorious predecessor. How would you evaluate “the father of modern drama”?

Jon Fosse (JF): In Norway people

read Ibsen at school. I too read him in my tender years, and I must confess that I found him rather stiff in those days. However, with the years I realized how disturbing and demonic he could be. And then he has that dark wisdom. I don’t love Ibsen; but I am his big admirer.

AA: Isn’t it a contradiction in terms

that you admire Ibsen, but you don’t love him? Could you please elaborate on that?

JF: What I wanted to say is that I don’t have any doubt that Ibsen is one of the greatest playwrights of the world and that he is second only to Shakespeare. But what I object to is his sacrifice of the

poetic self for the so-called causes of society. The poet in Ibsen that we find in *Brand*, or in *Peer Gynt*, a play which I've translated into New Norwegian, and which was staged by Robert Wilson in 2005, is not to be traced in his later plays. This is inevitable when one writes with "social consciousness" upon his back. If the concerns of society enter your work automatically, it's fine. But a writer should not be at all bothered about it.

AA: How do you look at Shakespeare?

JF: Shakespeare is at the centre of European tradition, and European literature without Shakespeare just doesn't make any sense to me. If there were no Shakespeare, there would have been no Ibsen.

AA: Leif Zern termed you as "an alien" in the world of theatre because you were rather reluctant to come to theatre. Indeed, you made your debut as a playwright with *And Never Shall We be Parted* in 1994. Now that you have been in theatre for over a decade with might, how will you account for your "alien" status?

JF: Yes, I entered the theatre rather late. I was writing poetry, I was writing novels, I was writing essays. And I enjoyed doing them. It just didn't occur to me that I

would write for the theatre. Then I was asked to write for it, and I found out that writing for theatre was a different kind of experience, an experience which I had begun to love. So that's how it was and is.

AA: Does Fosse figure in Fosse's works?

JF: I would say, no. But then you know, I've experienced which my characters also experience. I explore human relationships, and in doing so, I may have occasionally betrayed Fosse, the individual.

AA: Your fiction employs the first-person narrative technique; the dialogue in your drama is sheer monologue. And it's a wonder how you manage to create a poetic language out of ordinary, everyday utterances.

JF: I am always concerned about the rhythm of the language in my work. It's like a piece of painting. I'm painting through metaphors. Every word has its special importance. They need to be arranged in much the same way shades and colours are arranged in a painting. The lasting impression of a painting is that it's a poem. My characters speak poetically because it's my reconstruction of the language I hear or think. The reconstruction of oral language means for me that it will have to be realistic and at the same time artificial, a feature one notices also in Ibsen.

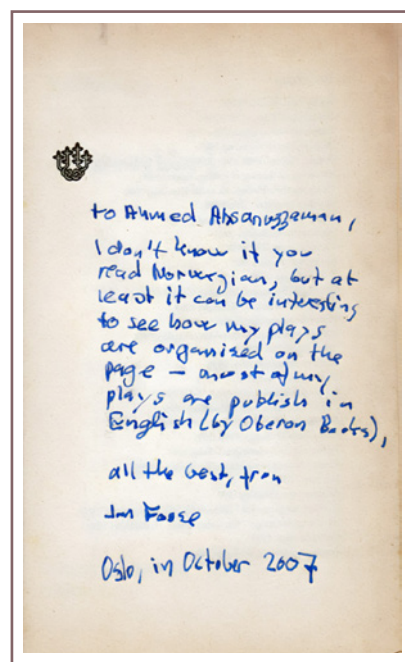
AA: You are often called a post-modernist because of your gifted use of Derrida's concept of "absence" in your fiction. Your response?

JF: I don't know exactly if I'm a postmodernist. But Derrida was obviously an early influence. I read him extensively, and influenced by Derrida's theory of writing I submitted my master's thesis on

the theory of novel.

AA: If you were asked to choose two writers, whom will you go for?

JF: My compatriot, though little known to the world outside, Olav H. Hauge. He, in one sense, inspired my collection of poems, *Angel with Water in His Eyes*, published in 1986. And the other is one of the heavyweights of world literature, Samuel Beckett.

AA: Once you wrote, "But who am I then, who is supposed to be Jon Fosse?" It is one of the questions that disturbs every creative individual at a certain point in his career. The answer to the question is, of course, difficult to get by. You have been on the lookout for it all these years. How do you feel about it?

JF: Yes, it's a question related to my existence as a writer. I don't have an answer yet.

AA: Thank you so much for giving me your time.

JF: Thank you too. •

Narratives Unbound: Revisiting Partition's Legacy

Through the crucible of three partitions, Bangladesh's national identity has been forged and re-forged, with literature, art, and cinema serving as the smithies of our collective consciousness. These mediums offer not just a lens to view our layered past of loss, grief, and trauma but also a mirror reflecting the intricate mosaic of who we are.

These themes were highlighted by Bangla Academy Literary Award winning author, translator and critic Professor Dr. Fakrul Alam during a lecture he delivered at Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB) on February 7, 2024. Prof. Alam is the Bangabandhu Chair at the Department of History, University of Dhaka, and Honorary Advisor to the Sasheen Center for Multilingual Excellence (SCMLE) and the Department of English and Modern Languages, IUB.

The lecture, titled "The 1947 Partition from a Thrice-Partitioned National Perspective," was the inaugural

session of the Sasheen Annual Lecture organized by SCMLE. The annual lectures aim to host leading figures in the fields of literary studies, linguistics, education, anthropology, cultural and communication studies, and beyond to build an interdisciplinary atmosphere at IUB underlined by liberal arts ethos.

Prof. Alam, who translated Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman's Unfinished Memoirs, Prison Diaries, Ocean of Sorrow, Bishad Sindhu, Gitanjali and a host of Jibanananda Das's poems, said in his lecture that the historical relevance of the three partitions would never be obsolete. Beginning with the "originary and short-lived partition" of 1905, Prof. Alam talked about how partition has been depicted in literary and cinematic forms with reference to 1947 and 1971 partitions.

In Professor Alam's speech, it became evident how literary scholars and filmmakers give us lenses to deal with loss, grief, trauma from many

dimensions and make us aware of who we are. It is this ability to see all those opaque things and acknowledge insightfully as they shape our identity.

Mr. Tanvir Mokammel, renowned filmmaker and author, and Razia Sultana Khan, PhD, Advisor to IUB's Department of English and Modern Languages (DEML), took part in a discussion on the lecture. Mr. Didar A Husain, Chairman, Board of Trustees, IUB; Vice Chancellor Tanweer Hasan, PhD; and Pro-Vice Chancellor Prof. Niaz Ahmed Khan, PhD, also spoke at the program.

Ahmed Ahsanuzzaman, PhD, Professor at DEML, introduced the keynote speaker. Mahmud Hasan Khan, PhD, Executive Director of SCMLE and Professor at DEML, moderated the event. Alongside IUB students, faculty and staff, a good number of noted personalities, and faculties and students from other universities attended the program. •

23 Non-engineering Faculties Complete Basic Python Training

A total of 23 faculty members of IUB have successfully completed a basic Python programming course, aimed at enhancing their digital skills under the university's "Coding for All" initiative. The training was conducted in two batches, with the first group comprising 10 faculty from various departments including Global Studies and Governance, Management Information Systems, Development Studies, Life Sciences, and Pharmacy during the Autumn 2023 semester.

The second batch included 13 faculty members from a broader range of disciplines such as Environmental Science and Management, Social Science and Humanities, English and Modern Languages, Economics, International Business, Marketing, and Pharmacy.

The certificate ceremony for the first batch was held on December 21, 2023, at the Center for Cognitive Skill Enhancement (CCSE) laboratory. Tanweer Hasan, PhD, Vice Chancellor of IUB; Prof. Meherun Ahmed, PhD, Dean of the School of Business and Entrepreneurship; and Prof. Mamun Bin Ibne Reaz, PhD, Dean of the School of Engineering, Technology and Sciences, attended the event.

The four-week workshops, titled "Automate your day with Python," were designed to equip participants with practical Python programming skills, focussing on automating everyday tasks, such as sending personalized mass emails, organizing files, and handling data in Excel spreadsheets.

Professor Mahmud Hasan Khan, PhD, from the Department of English and Modern Languages and Executive Director at the Sasheen Centre for Multilingual Excellence, who

participated in the first batch, said, "I wanted to know more about how to use Python to study Big Data. As a linguistic researcher, I work with huge volumes of text including interviews, transcripts, and manuscripts. At the workshop, I got the basic idea about how to use Python to set the parameters for sentiment analysis."

Launched in 2023, the "Coding for All" initiative has already seen several hundred students from different engineering and non-engineering departments receive coding training, marking a significant milestone in the university's commitment to digital literacy. •

Started as an undergraduate thesis, this project was later expanded with contributions from global academic partners and tested for its practical implications, achieving remarkable accuracy in mask detection. This publication, dated December 7, 2023, highlights IUB's commitment to innovative research in response to contemporary global challenges. •

IUB Alum Naveed Named Global Sustainability Leader

IUB alum Navid Bin Ahmed was named a UPG Sustainability Leader on February 9, 2024, for his innovative AI technology, ShiatsuOne.

This award was part of the "Journey to Hurricane Campaign," held from January 12 to February 5, 2024. Navid's AI technology supports the UN's Sustainable Development Goals by enhancing disease detection capabilities, including COVID-19.

His project won international acclaim, showcasing how technological innovation can address global health challenges and promote sustainable development.

Navid's winning entry revolves around his innovative AI technology, ShiatsuOne, designed to support the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs),



specifically SDGs 3, 9, and 17.

This novel innovation aims to remotely detect diseases like COVID-19, Pneumonia, and Bronchitis, reflecting a significant advancement in medical technology and global health. •

CSE Research Day Celebrates Innovation



On March 7, 2024, the Department of Computer Science and Engineering hosted its Annual Research Day.

The event highlighted significant achievements such as 32 journal and 144

conference publications in 2023, and multiple wins in tech contests.

Notably, the event also featured personal engagements with Freedom Fighters AMG Kabir

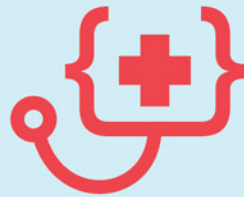
