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Cox's Bazar & the Blue Flag Standard: A Study on Coastal Tourism Sustainability

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Abstract - Cox's Bazar, the world's longest sandy sea beach, is key to Bangladesh's coastal tourism. However, it faces increasing pressures from pollution, unplanned urban growth, and climate change. To ensure its sustainability, it is essential to follow global standards like the Blue Flag Standard. This eco-label certifies beaches based on strict criteria for water quality, waste management, safety, and environmental education. This study looks at how well the Blue Flag framework can apply to Cox's Bazar by examining current tourism practices, policies, and views from stakeholders. The findings highlight significant gaps in infrastructure, enforcement, and community awareness that hinder sustainable management. Introducing the Blue Flag system could boost conservation efforts, draw eco-minded tourists, and improve the global standing of Cox's Bazar. In the end, this research suggests that eco-certification provides a practical way to balance environmental health with socio-economic growth in Bangladesh's coastal tourism sector.

I. INTRODUCTION

Cox's Bazar, the world's longest sandy beach, plays a key role in Bangladesh's tourism economy. However, it faces threats from pollution, poor waste management, and climate change[2][18]. These issues put both the environment and the long-term viability of tourism at risk. The Blue Flag Standard is an international eco-label for beaches. It focuses on water quality, safety, waste management, and environmental awareness.[20][7] This study looks at how the Blue Flag framework could be used in Cox's Bazar to improve management protect natural resources and set the beach as an example for sustainable coastal tourism in Bangladesh [1][4].

II. LITERATURE REVIEW

Cox's Bazar highlights the significant potential and the challenges of achieving sustainable coastal tourism in Bangladesh. Studies on tourist perceptions and environmentally responsible behavior show that people are becoming more aware of ecological issues. However, they also point to problems like inadequate infrastructure, pollution, and poor management practices. Research on sustainable tourism in disaster-prone coastal areas stresses the need for integrated planning to balance economic benefits with environmental resilience. Meanwhile, marine litter surveys expose severe waste management issues along

the beaches. Although the Blue Flag program is known internationally as a standard for clean, safe, and well-managed beaches, there is little research connecting its criteria to Cox's Bazar. Most studies view Blue Flag as a policy goal instead of a tested framework in Bangladesh. This creates a gap for research that examines its feasibility, local adaptation, and potential to turn Cox's Bazar into a model for sustainable coastal tourism. [5], [3], [12], [14].

III. METHODOLOGY

This study uses multi modal approaches to mitigate noise through biodegradable composite materials. The method includes the following steps:

Research Design: A descriptive digital survey design was used to explore stakeholders' views on tourism sustainability in Cox's Bazar and the possible adoption of the Blue Flag Standard. A structured questionnaire was given both online and offline through QR code scanning. It targeted tourists, residents, business owners, and students from related fields.

Data Collection: The survey included questions about awareness of coastal pollution, perceptions of environmental management, views on the importance of international certification (Blue Flag), willingness to support eco-friendly initiatives, and expectations for sustainable tourism. The questions were presented as multiple-choice and Likert-scale responses to capture attitudes and the strength of opinions.

Data Analysis: Microsoft Excel and Python were used for quantitative analysis. Frequency counts and percentages were calculated for each survey item. The results were compared with existing studies on coastal sustainability and global Blue Flag practices to find similarities, gaps, and potential strategies that could benefit Bangladesh's tourism sector.

IV. RESULTS

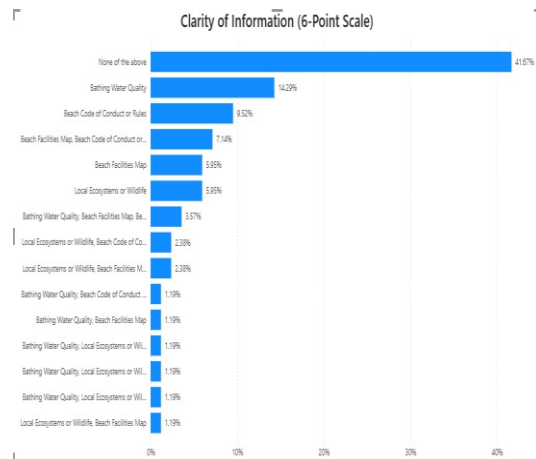


Fig 1: Clarity of Information

Respondents pointed out which parts of beach information are communicated the best. "None of the above" was chosen by 41.67%, showing a general lack of clarity. Among the specific aspects, bathing water quality was noted by 14.49%, and the beach code of conduct/rules by 9.52%. Other areas, such as beach facilities at 8.14% and 5.95%, local ecosystems at 5.95%, and extra bathing water information at 3.57%, received less attention. This suggests that the current information on environmental and management features of Cox's Bazar is limited or not consistently shared with stakeholders.

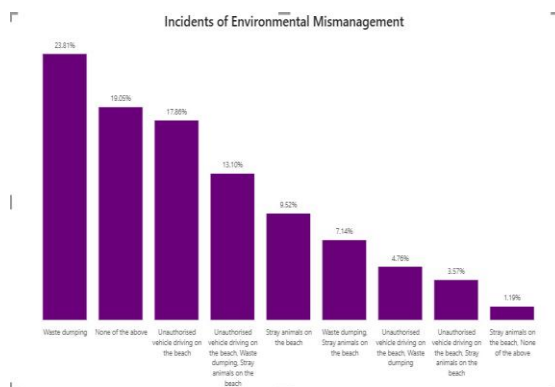


Fig 2: Incidents of Environmental Mismanagement

Respondents identified key issues affecting the beach environment in Cox's Bazar. Waste dumping was the most reported problem at 23.81%. This was followed by no issues observed at 19.05%, unauthorized vehicle driving on the beach at 17.86%, and stray animals on the beach at 13.01%. These findings highlight significant management challenges, especially in waste control and enforcement of regulations, which could affect both environmental quality and visitor experience.

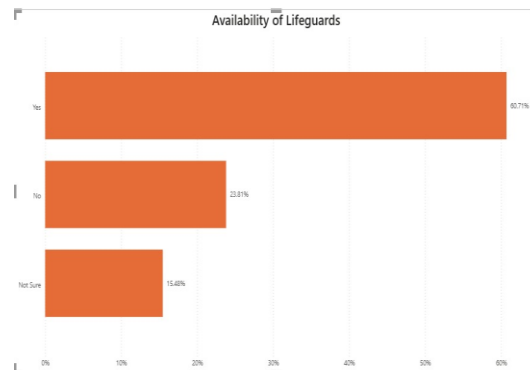


Fig 3: Availability of Guards

Among respondents, 60.71% reported that beach guards are available. 23.81% stated there were no guards present, and 15.48% were unsure. This indicates that while most people notice some level of supervision, a significant number of visitors feel there are safety gaps at Cox's Bazar.

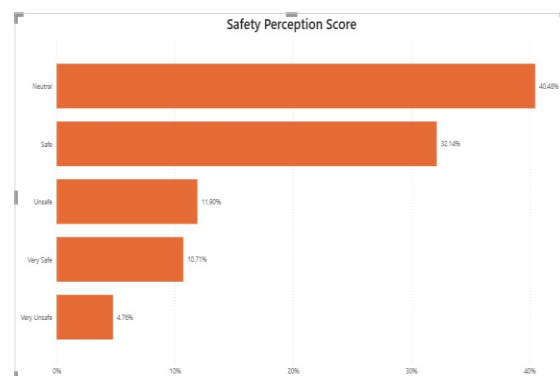


Fig 4: Safety Perception Score

Respondents' views on beach safety indicate that 40.48% feel neutral, 32.14% see it as safe, and 10.71% feel very safe. A smaller group perceives risks, with 11.90% feeling unsafe and 4.76% feeling very unsafe. Overall, most visitors have a neutral to positive opinion of safety, although a notable minority still has concerns.

V. DISCUSSION

The survey shows that information clarity at Cox's Bazar is limited. The largest group of respondents chose "None of the above," indicating that many visitors feel there is little clear guidance. Only a small number noticed specific details like bathing water quality or beach rules. Key management issues include waste dumping and unauthorized vehicle use. Most respondents saw beach guards, but some noted a lack of supervision. Overall, safety perceptions were mostly neutral or safe, but a significant minority felt unsafe. The findings indicate that while some measures are in place, there are still significant gaps in environmental management, information sharing, and visitor awareness. This highlights the possible benefits of implementing standards like the Blue Flag for sustainable coastal tourism.

VI. CONCLUSION AND FUTURE OUTLOOK

The study shows that Cox's Bazar has issues with environmental management, clear information, and visitor safety. Some measures are in place, like beach guards and basic facilities, but there are still major gaps in waste management, illegal activities, and public awareness. Most respondents feel neutral to safety, but a few express concerns. This highlights the need for better supervision and education. Adopting international standards like the Blue Flag could improve environmental sustainability, safety, and the beach's global reputation. It would help balance tourism growth with environmental protection. Good planning, enforcement, and community involvement are vital for making Cox's Bazar a model for sustainable coastal tourism in Bangladesh.

The road ahead for Cox's Bazar coastal tourism sustainability is assessing Blue Flag accreditation viability, optimizing waste and marine debris management, and promoting green infrastructure. Strengthened community engagement, climate adaptability, and policy reform will be instrumental in aligning local practice with global standards. Comparative experience from other Blue Flag beaches and long-term monitoring through data-based instruments can make Cox's Bazar a model for coastal tourism sustainability.

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
