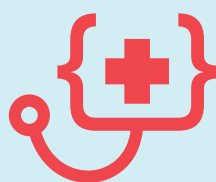

Renewable, Responsible

By training, they are electrical and electronic engineers, and are therefore good with circuits, transistors, semiconductors and other fancy electronic stuff that mobile phones, computers, tablets, even household gadgets like fridge, washing machines and air conditioners run on. When Md. Sadik Abdal and Tashfia Tahsin joined the Electrical and Electronic Engineering (EEE) department at Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB), they too were thinking about inventing breakthrough gadgets.

Four years later, they did make a breakthrough, but not for the typical urban, gadget user; they came up with a solution that might help Bangladeshi farmers and agriculturists save billions of taka.

“During the Covid-19 pandemic, every day around four billion litres of milk got wasted

because there was no transport and small dairy farmers did not have any way to preserve them,” said Sadik, who completed his graduation from IUB earlier this year and is now working as an assistant engineer at Global Renewable Energy Limited.

“Also, every year, potatoes worth BDT 25 billion are wasted due to shortage of storage facilities in rural areas where it’s not possible to have a cold storage at every village. The milk, potato and other agricultural products that get wasted due to this are economic losses,” added Sadik, whose areas of interest are crypto, artificial intelligence, virtual reality, augmented reality, 3D augmentation, and of course, renewable energy.

The Project

So, Sadik and Tashfia came up with an innovative solution to this problem. They designed a solar-powered cold



storage to preserve milk, potatoes, etc. Big cold storages are power-hungry. Also, the number of cold storages in rural areas is nowhere near the actual demand. So, a solar-powered cold storage would be really convenient for farmers. These would be small, hence can be run on solar power and can serve marginal farmers’ needs, who can either buy them individually or in groups. Once the season for their products are over, they can even rent it out to other farmers. That way, they will not have to run to the big cold storages where getting space is not easy.

The design also addresses a major contemporary global problem, the energy crisis. Solar power is the most abundant source of energy in rural Bangladesh, and more importantly, it’s green and hence is good for the environment. Also, in a world where ensuring a sustainable energy-secure future for all has remained elusive, use of solar power makes this cold storage affordable for farmers.

Tashfia, who is now in her last year at IUB, said, “Initially, we did a few mathematical calculations and based on those calculations, we did a mockup in the 3D modelling software called Blender. After doing some further mathematical modelling, we came up

with the actual idea. We also had to determine how much square footage was going to be optimum for a solar-powered chilling system.”

They might be engineers, but they had to put on the hat of a business analyst as well. They didn’t just want to come up with a prototype; they wanted to make sure this was something that farmers would be interested in.

“We did both statistical analysis and studied business cases. Eventually, we want to develop a business model and promote it to a larger audience,” said Tashfia, whose areas of interests are renewable energy and design.

The Gold

In June 2022, their design won gold at the prestigious Efficiency for Access Design Challenge 2021-22 in the UK, organised by the Efficiency for Access

Coalition and Engineers Without Borders, UK. As partners, they had two students from The City, University of London, UK - Ali Ahmed and Nour Ben Gaied. Their team initially received USD 1,000 to develop the 3D design.

Funded by the Netherlands-based IKEA Foundation, the Efficiency for Access Design Challenge is a multidisciplinary competition that empowers teams of university students to accelerate clean energy access for low and middle income countries. This year, over 150 students from 22 universities in Bangladesh, Benin, Cameroon, India, Kenya, Mozambique, Nigeria, Pakistan, Senegal, Sweden, Uganda, the UK, the USA, and Zimbabwe took part in the challenge.

Prof. Dr. Khosru Mohammad Salim from the EEE department supervised the team. He said, “Many engineers

and academicians work on green energy. But it is important to arrange these competitions to boost students’ interests in this field. I tried my best to help them with my experience. Every member of the team worked with extreme dedication. If this cold storage system can be properly marketed, a lot of farmers would be benefitted.”

IUB Vice Chancellor Tanweer Hasan, PhD, said, “Our students have made us really proud with their hard work and creativity. Research and innovation are at the heart of IUB’s academic outlook. Their collaboration with the City, University of London, in developing this design also highlights the importance of international partnerships for building an energy-secure future.”

Sadik and Tashfia are currently working to develop a real life prototype out of the 3D model. ●



‘Rome was not built in a day’

Q. How did you get involved with IUB?

30 years ago, the concept of a private university was completely new. The founders of IUB had to develop the idea from scratch. It was nothing short of a mega project. My involvement with IUB began mainly as an investor at that time when my friends Mr. A Matin Chowdhury, Mr. KZ Mahmud and Mr. Rashed Chowdhury, approached me. There were also people like Dr. A. Majeed Khan and Mrs. Yasmeen Murshed. Seeing people like them involved in this and that too with a noble yet innovative cause, I was convinced. Also, at that time, the public universities could not really cope up with the demand for higher education. So, a private university made a lot of sense. What we also wanted to do was build a university of global standards. After I got involved with IUB, I began to realize that the education sector needed contribution from the private sector. After that, I also started donating in the education sector out of my social responsibility.

Q. As a founder trustee, would you say IUB is where you thought it would be when you founded this university?

Yes, of course. I think IUB has done quite well. I won't say we have achieved everything we wanted to when we

started, but we have definitely come quite a long way. And I am extremely proud and happy to see that IUB is heading in the right direction.

Q. If an IUB student wants to become a self-made industrialist like you, what would be your advice?

There is an old saying: Rome was not built in a day. If you want to build a career in a certain field, you must have some sort of knack for that trade. If a student wants to become an industrialist,

they should groom themselves up in a fitting fashion and they must start very young, as early as the first day of their university lives. They can go and visit factories and manufacturing plants in different industries and learn

how financial management is done. For example, since I am involved in the textile business, I can say that one thing that young aspiring industrialists need to learn very well is supply chain management. No matter which industry you are in, supply chain management is one of the most important things. There is no shortcut to becoming an industrialist - you will have to build your business brick by brick. Things are very much different these days compared to our times. When I started my business nearly 50 years ago, there was very little competition. But, one of the biggest challenges was gathering finance. That however has changed. There is now very tough competition all over, but also, getting loans have become much easier now compared to our days.

Q. Where do you want to see IUB in another 30 years?

A. In 30 years, IUB should become a global university. We should have international prominence. I am sure that if we can manage everything well, we will definitely be able to achieve that target and the members of the Board of Trustees will always wholeheartedly support this journey all the way through. ●

Turning the Tables

IUB wins four gold medals in inter-university table tennis

The story of Sharmin Islam Shroddha, who won three gold medals in table tennis at the Bangabandhu Inter-University Sports Championship 2022, began the day she stepped into IUB for the first time.

“One of my first memories at IUB is of a long banner hanging in the amphitheatre area. It had a picture of the table tennis team, holding a trophy,” said Shroddha. She never played table tennis before but the next thing she did was find out where the table tennis yard was.

“I had no idea how to play the game. But I kept playing with my friends. Then coach Hafiz Sir spotted me and then I started having some idea about how the game was played,” reminisced Shroddha, now in her last semester in the Department of Computer Science and Engineering (CSE).

Rosa Mahmud Taran, another CSE student, has a similar story. Just like Shroddha, she also never played table tennis before coming to IUB. But together they won the gold in women's doubles table tennis. What began as fun for Shroddha and Rosa, eventually ended up in three gold medals..

“I used to play several sports in school, but I never played table tennis. When I came to IUB, I always saw there was a crowd at the table tennis zone in the basement. So, I thought why not try out a new sport,” said Rosa.

“Shroddha and Taran are the hardest working players I have ever seen. They read a very demanding subject like CSE. Still, they manage to keep good grades and win gold medals. It's incredible how much they have learned in just a few years,” said IUB's Senior Table Tennis Coach Md. Hafizur Rahman, who has been involved with the game for 42 years as a player, umpire, organiser and coach.

Of the four golds IUB won in table tennis, Shroddha was involved in three:

women's singles, women's doubles (with Taran), and mixed doubles.

IUB's male table tennis players Md. Rifat Mahmud Sabbir and Antu Hossain Joy were equally up to the task. Sabbir, who is from the Department of Human Resources, won two gold medals: mixed doubles (with Shroddha) and men's doubles (with Antu). Sabbir is currently the number-3 table tennis player in national rankings. He has represented

Bangladesh in major international meets such as the Commonwealth Games in the UK, where he played in the quarterfinals; South Asian Federation Games in Nepal, where he was part of the bronze winning team; and South Asian Junior TT Championship in Maldives, where he was part of the gold winning team.

“I am studying at IUB with a sports scholarship for table tennis. I feel really happy that finally I am able to give something back,” said Sabbir, who is from BKSP, Bangladesh's biggest sports academy.

Antu, who is from the Department of Marketing and is currently the number-8 player in national rankings, also started playing table tennis as a kid and has taken part in many age-level competitions. “IUB has a table tennis culture. Everybody plays table tennis here. It's very heartening,” said Antu, who also has a sports scholarship at IUB.

Coach Hafiz said, “The way we worked with the boys was different from how we worked with the girls. The boys already have exposure to professional setups. For them, it was mostly about fine tuning. But for the girls, we had to build their game up from scratch. More than anything else, we tried to make them start believing that they can take on any opponent.”

All four players said they would very much like to take up table tennis as a career. With proper support, training and patronage, they think they can translate this success into international glory. ●

Q: Tell us about your journey after graduating from IUB.

After working nearly 20 years, I quit Asiatic in 2022 as the Head of Strategic Planning. Recently, I joined Adcom, another top advertising agency in the country, as the Head of Strategic Planning.

Q: Did your time at IUB had an impact on how you turned out in professional life?

Yes, it has a profound impact on my career. When I first started school at IUB, I had no idea what I wanted to do with my life. I chose Accounting, then Finance and I finally settled with Marketing. In my 3rd year, I did a course on Advertising, which was taken by Prof Hossain Mohammad. Hossain Sir's classes sparked my love for advertising. Now, I have been in the communications field for almost 20 years.

Q: Would you recommend advertising as a career option for a current IUB student?

I most definitely would. Advertising is electric! We think advertising only exists to convince people to buy things. But advertising touches people's lives too. We have taught people to wash their hands and feed children nutritious food. We have tried to change parents' behaviour to stop child marriage. We built brands that people fell in love with and brought positive change in this world. The advertising industry is on the brink of a boom. And we need good minds. Local corporate companies are growing and soon they will shift their focus from sales to branding.

Q: How should a current IUB student prepare for a meaningful career in advertising?

It's important for an aspiring advertiser to learn marketing tactics, digital marketing, understand the different vehicles of media, have a fair bit of exposure to research and most importantly, understand people. IUB to launch first ever trading lab at university level in Bangladesh



LankaBangla Securities Limited (LBSL) and Independent University, Bangladesh (IUB) signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) to start the first ever digital financial trading lab at the university level in the country on June 12, 2022. Mohammed Nasir Uddin Chowdhury, Managing Director of LBSL, and Tanweer Hasan, PhD, Vice Chancellor of IUB, signed the MoU on behalf of their respective organisations.

The lab is being set up under the Industry-Academia Collaboration Initiatives of IUB's School of Business and Entrepreneurship (SBE). Under the supervision and guidance of LBSL experts and IUB's Finance professors, groups of selected 3rd and final year students of IUB will get to learn how Dhaka and Chittagong Stock Exchanges, the two stock markets in the country, operate. Under strict supervision and subject to receiving permission from their guardians, students will learn to open their own BO accounts, carry out transactions at the stock markets, analyse market trends and make their own trading decisions. In addition, they will also be able to use the trading portal and a number of proprietary applications and softwares of LBSL. ●



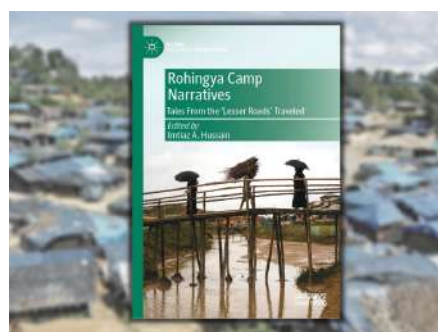
Pharma Fest brings industry and academia experts together
